The role



The candidate will be contributing to a new EPSRC research project led by Prof Brassart on the Multiphysics Modelling of Biodegradable Polymers (MMBoP). The project's vision is to enable the rational design of biodegradable polymers for load-bearing applications by developing a coupled-field continuum mechanics framework, specific constitutive models, and robust computational tools. The project focuses on polymers degrading by hydrolysis in water (e.g. PLA, PCL), with emphasis on biomedical applications (bioresorbable implants, sutures, drug delivery). However, the modelling and simulation tools generated by the project will be directly relevant to a broader class of chemical degradation phenomena in polymers.

The candidate will be involved in the development and numerical implementation of a continuum theory coupling large deformations, mass transport (water, reaction products), and hydrolytic degradation. The theory will be formulated within a rigorous thermodynamic framework to identify coupled chemo-mechanical effects. Physics-based constitutive models for rubbery and glassy polymers will be proposed to describe the effect of progressive network degradation on the mechanical properties. The theory will be implemented in a finite element code (user-defined subroutine UEL for Abaqus) in order to solve general boundary-value problems on representative geometries.

Responsibilities

Specific Tasks

- Contribute to the development of the continuum theory and constitutive models for polymers degrading by hydrolysis
- Implement the theory as a user-defined element (UEL) for Abaqus
- Validate constitutive models by comparing results to experimental data from the literature
- Conduct numerical case studies relevant to biomedical applications
- Liaise with collaborators to the project within and outside the Department
- Participate to DPhil and 4th Year Project supervision in relation to the project
- Participate to the dissemination of outcomes via conference presentations and writing of papers

Additional Tasks

- Manage own academic research and administrative activities. This involves small scale project management, to co-ordinate multiple aspects of work to meet deadlines
- Adapt existing and develop new scientific techniques and experimental protocols
- Test hypotheses and analyse scientific data from a variety of sources, reviewing and refining working hypotheses as appropriate
- Contribute ideas for new research projects
- Develop ideas for generating research income, and present detailed research proposals to senior researchers
- Collaborate in the preparation of scientific reports and journal articles and occasionally present papers and posters
- Use specialist scientific equipment in a laboratory environment
- Act as a source of information and advice to other members of the group on scientific protocols and experimental techniques
- Represent the research group at external meetings/seminars, either with other members of the group or alone
- Carry out collaborative projects with colleagues in partner institutions, and research groups
- The researcher may have the opportunity to undertake ad-hoc paid teaching (this includes lecturing, demonstrating, small-group teaching, tutoring of undergraduates and graduate students and supervision of masters projects in collaboration with principal investigators).

Permission must be sought in advance for each opportunity and the total must not exceed 4 hours a week.

Selection criteria

Essential

- Hold a PhD/DPhil in Mechanical Engineering or other related field (or near completion*), together with relevant experience.
- Have established knowledge/expertise in solid mechanics and constitutive modelling of materials (viscoelasticity, viscoplasticity, hyperelasticity).
- Have established knowledge/expertise in the Finite Element method.
- Have significant coding experience (C/C++ or Fortran, Python)
- Ability to manage own academic research and associated activities
- Previous experience of contributing to publications/presentations
- Ability to contribute ideas for new research projects and research income generation
- Excellent communication skills, including the ability to write for publication, present research proposals and results, and represent the research group at meetings

**please note that 'near completion' means that you must have submitted your PhD thesis.*

Desirable

- Experience with the finite element software Abaqus (including programming user subroutines)
- Knowledge/expertise in polymer physics and/or polymer modelling (e.g. rubber elasticity)
- Knowledge/expertise in coupled-field problems (e.g. diffusion coupled to mechanics)

Engineering Science Department

Engineering teaching and research takes place at Oxford in a unified Department of Engineering Science whose academic staff are committed to a common engineering foundation as well as to advanced work in their own specialities, which include most branches of the subject. We have especially strong links with computing, materials science and medicine. The Department employs about 120 academic staff (this number includes 13 statutory Professors appointed in the main branches of the discipline, and 25 other professors in the Department); in addition there are 9 Visiting Professors. There is an experienced team of teaching support staff, clerical staff and technicians. The Department has well-equipped laboratories and workshops, which together with offices, lecture theatres, library and other facilities have a net floor area of about 22,000 square metres.

Teaching

We aim to admit 160-170 undergraduates per year, all of whom take a 4-year Engineering Science course leading to the MEng degree. The course is accredited at MEng level by the major engineering institutions. The syllabus has a common core extending through the first two years. Specialist options are introduced in the third year, and the fourth year includes further specialist material and a major project.

Research

The Department was ranked the top engineering department in the UK, as measured by overall GPA, in the Research Excellence Framework 2014 exercise.
